Abstract:

The purpose of the seminar is to share the professional and personal experiences in the field of educational development of one scholar from the global south.

CICE's Visiting Professor Paula Razquin is a faculty member at Universidad de San Andrés (Argentina). Her work centers on teacher labor markets and teacher policies; the design, planning, monitoring and evaluation of education policies; international and comparative education, and the education development goals. Prior to her current appointment, Dr. Razquin worked at UNESCO-Paris, as a program specialist at the Division for Education Strategies & Capacity Building (Paris) and as a research officer at UNESCO's Education for All Global Monitoring Report team. She contributed to several multilateral and bilateral agencies (most recently UNESCO-IIEP Buenos Aires office, USAID, the Flemish Association for Development Cooperation and Technical Assistance, and UNRWA). Over her career, she was involved in projects in Argentina, Chile, Bolivia, Ecuador, Equatorial Guinea, Jordan, Mexico, Nicaragua, Nigeria, the United States, and Uruguay. Dr. Razquin holds a Ph.D. in International Comparative Education, an M.A. in Sociology, and an M.A. in International Educational Administration and Policy Analysis, all from Stanford University. She was also a RAND/Spencer Postdoctoral Fellow on Education Policy (RAND Corporation, Education Unit, in California).

In the CICE seminar, Dr. Razquin will share her career story, what she has learned as a scholar from the global south, and the challenges faced along the way. She hopes her experience sheds some light on IDEC's graduate students as they consider their career development and plans in the field.
